HOUSE CORPORATION REPORT

Revitalizing Gamma Zeta *Major Changes Abound as Chapter Looks to Enhance the ATO Experience for the Future*

The House Corporation and other alumni have been particularly active with the Gamma Zeta undergraduates these last few months and we'd like to give you an update.

Structurally, we are striving to make improvements to the physical plant. The house has experienced rough treatment by the undergrads, inadequate on-going cleaning and maintenance, and many years since any significant capital improvements and repairs have been made. On the positive side, the house is full and our financial situation is excellent. And, we've carefully assessed the current membership and do not believe we have "bad guys". Individually, they are bright, ambitious, interesting young men. Collectively, they need a refresher of what is expected of them as ATOs, stressing our long-standing tradition of excellence in academics, intramurals, community service and leadership on campus.

Certainly some of the current negligent behavior can be attributed to negative trends in society. However, in examining the course of Gamma Zeta history, we've periodically faced significant challenges from the very beginning. As an example, we found an article in a 1923 Gamma Zeta newsletter titled "Take Care of Your Home." It was directed at the undergraduates asking them rhetorically why it was that "...the great big 'he-men' of the chapter always pick the rooms with the delicate furniture to stage their boxing bouts and wrestling matches? Why do our sedentary brethren insist on throwing ashes on the floors and carpets?" The explanations given in the anonymous article range from "irresponsibility," to "laziness" to assumptions such as "it's none of my business" and "the freshmen will fix it."

We believe that 18- to 21-year-old young men left to their own devices, whether it was 1913 or 2013, are going to behave recklessly. Every other time that our chapter has experienced challenges, the solution has been for the alumni to get back involved and provide strong leadership, clear expectations and consequences for negative behaviors. I'm very pleased to report that a strong and active group of alumni has done just that in order to address our current challenges. During the last three months alone we have:

- Met in Chicago in December, January, March and April, and formed committees to address the most critical challenges.
- Had 15 alumni participate in the most recent initiation ceremony in Champaign along with Wynn Smiley, ATO CEO.
- Delivered a clear message to the undergraduates about expectations regarding care for the house and elimination of hazing.
- Developed a completely new process for cleaning and maintenance that is not reliant on non-resident pledges.
- Created a mentor program which already has over 80 alumni matched up with undergraduates to support academic improvement, resume building and internship and job placement.
- Developed a template for a new pledge training program that does not include hazing.
- Drafted a new governance process and bylaws for a bigger, stronger and more active Alumni Association and House Corporation, for approval by ATO National.

Ultimately, our goal would be harvest this positive momentum and launch a much needed multi-million dollar fundraising campaign to renovate the chapter house. Competing for student housing on campus continues to be challenging with new high rise complexes and

Aligning Our Members with the ATO Creed

Leading Media Executive and Committed ATO Jack Klues '77 Heads Up Membership Committee to Transform Active Chapter and Position Us for the Future

Thank you to Jack Klues '77 for participating in this Q&A. A committed volunteer and successful media executive, Jack has been instrumental in our chapter's "turnaround" effort and shares how he believes being an ATO means being part of something of value and of something bigger than himself.

What direction has your career taken since your Gamma Zeta days?

I have worked in the advertising agency business since graduation from Illinois in 1977. I was first hired by Leo Burnett as a client service account trainee starting in the media department. I never left Leo and media operations even though my career did require several changes of business cards over the last 35 years. I stayed in media rather than becoming an account executive. About 15 years ago, I led the "spin off" of the Leo Burnett media department to a global media agency called Starcom. Two years later, I was asked to also oversee and integrate a rival agency brand named Mediavest. Today, SMG is the largest media agency in US and the world. After being acquired by the French based holding company, Publicis Groupe, I took on additional responsibilities in managing all of its media and digital agency businesses which we call Vivaki (a combination of SMG, ZenithOptimedia, Razorfish and Digitas) who invests over 80 billion euros annually for many blue chip clients across 85 offices around the world. I plan to retire in July.

You lead ATO's Alumni Membership Committee. What is the initial focus of this committee?

My committee leads membership programs which includes the development of a new pledge training program, an aggressive anti-hazing policy enforcement as well as more productive alternatives, and provides assistance to undergrad rush efforts.

I am also looking into more innovative and contemporary techniques to incentify behavior of the undergrad membership in line with the ATO Creed and key principles of our brotherhood.



Absolutely. I must be honest here that I have not been close to the current membership or the house for more than 10 years. While I was able to stay in contact with my pledge class of 1977 with the help of committed brothers like **Dane Lurhsen '77**, I now see the important need for current members to know, appreciate, and

value the great legacy of brothers who have come before them. They say everyone needs to know where they came from in order to better know where they are going.

In a very practical sense, there will always be a need for financial support from alumni to keep the physical plant maintained and updated.

How many alumni are involved in this effort?

There are approximately 20 men involved, mostly from pledge classes starting in late '70s. With my membership group, we have about six. All of them are accomplished businessmen in their own right: lawyers, entrepreneurs, financiers, sales, real estate agents and even a restaurateur/city alderman. Beyond the membership committee, there are alumni task force groups dealing with communications, fundraising/capital, physical plant maintenance, mentoring and governance.

The newly formed GZ mentor program has over 80 alums participating, nearly one for each current member in the house.

What was it like participating in an initiation, like the one in January with Wynn Smiley, ATO National CEO?

It brought back a flood of terrific memories from my own initiation. More importantly, it reminded me of the thoughtful and time-tested principles of Alpha Tau Omega. It reminded me how lucky I am to be a part of the ATO experience and being part of something of value and bigger than myself. It also reminded me how fortunate we are to have talented, unselfish men like Wynn lead and promote our values for today's generation of new initiates and active members.

Where do we need more help?

There is always room for more alumni volunteers across all these task forces/committees. What we need is for all of us to stick with this thing we started. The worst thing we could do is to not deliver/stop our involvement and lose confidence/trust of current active membership.

Yesterday's Worthy Masters, Today's Leaders Four Former Chapter Leaders Share How Experiences at ATO Laid the Path for Successful Lives

Many Gamma Zetas testify that their experience as actives at ATO Illinois made a positive, lifelong impact on them. A compelling example of this are those who have served as Worthy Masters, then went on in life to fulfill significant leadership roles. As **Ed Ptacek '54** says, "Being Worthy Master does wonders for one's confidence to lead after you leave school."

We caught up with Ed and three other former Worthy Masters, each from different eras, to learn just how their service as Worthy Master uniquely equipped them to be leaders. Ed pursued a career in the Information Technology industry, was involved in marketing and sales, as well as executive management and consulting. **Bob Simonds '47** served as Worthy Master at *three* of ATO's chapters: Illinois, the University of

Pennsylvania and Ohio Wesleyan University, then was tapped as an assistant to ATO CEO Stewart Daniels. He spent many years in public relations, eventually becoming senior vice president for Ketchum, Inc., a major PR firm. **Dick Murphy '65** had a fascinating career as a Pentagon official in the White House, a California State Superior Judge and Mayor of San Diego. **Gerry Kostelny '75** is the founder and CEO of InSite Real Estate, a national owner, developer, and operator of commercial investment real estate.

The job of Worthy Master is far from easy. A fraternity chapter in a school the size of Illinois is home to a great variety of men with widely differing backgrounds, interests and expectations. While there are many good and memorable times, there can also be times of disagreement and challenge. A Worthy Master must lead in such a way that unites the chapter to work toward common goals. That challenge came

up repeatedly in the stories of these Worthy Masters.

"Working together to achieve an over-reaching goal despite existing differences is something that I first learned as Worthy Master and use regularly in my business and other activities," says Gerry.

The challenge Dick faced while Worthy Master was a group of undergrads who were high on the party life and low in academics. The chapter faced certain academic probation from National and there was

> no choice but to turn things around. He found that keen listening made the difference, adding that "you build consensus by trying to figure out what the other person wants, what each group wants."

Ed pointed out the importance of building a good team: "You learn to organize and carefully staff with the right

co-leaders. The chapter moves ahead, based on the job done by these brothers. I never forgot that lesson."

These leadership experiences uniquely moti-

vated these Worthy Masters and equipped them to become successful leaders in their lives and careers. Dick observes, "As a result, that experience gave me confidence that I could work in other environments where you convince people, building consensus among differing groups

working together toward a common goal." Those skills were challenged while he was Mayor

of San Diego, working hard to improve the city, even as a burgeoning pension deficit overshadowed his initiatives. Gerry relates by adding, "Working together to achieve an over-reaching goal despite existing differences is something that I first learned as Worthy Master and use regularly in my business and other activities."

Bob said that his ATO experience transformed his outlook, "I learned that a hick from the sticks of southern Illinois had the same opportunity to show leadership —and the same number of votes in a chapter meeting—as the guy from the affluent suburbs."

> So what are the qualities of a good leader? Dick got a rare view of leadership at the highest levels while serving in the White House. "They were not extraordinary people, but they were focused, worked hard, maybe a little bit lucky," he observed. "They persevered. They got to where they were, they knew what they wanted, worked hard at it, got positions of significant influence,

not so much by talent, but hard work." His 2011 book, *San Diego's Judge Mayor: How Murphy's Law Blindsided Leadership with 2020 Vision* chronicles his own journey and life lessons.

Gerry says that success involves focus and drive: "Find something you enjoy and are proficient at, become the best you can be at it, and focus on it to the exclusion of competing interests," he said.

That said, drive – the unrelenting effort in good times and bad to meet your objective – may be the single most important component of success. In most cases, drive trumps even raw talent."

Today, Bob faces the challenges of Lou Gehrig's Disease (ALS), yet the qualities of perseverance and teamwork drive his passion to raise support in the search for a cure. "Last year, with tremendous support from my ATO brothers the Bob Simonds Team was #1

among 234 teams in the ALS Walk4Life," he shares. "We're now organizing for the 2013 Walk."

Ed applauds that kind of ATO teamwork with GZ alums who are actively working to improve the chapter, making a difference for the next generation. "They are active members, they don't just belong," he said. "I know Bob Simonds provides them with the inspiration to continue what makes Gamma Zeta so special."




ATO Brothers Dominate in Athletics

A Real American Hero

Following the Fascinating Career of Maj. Gen. Edward Giller '40, Who Got His Start at ATO By Dane Luhrsen '77

Just do a simple Google search on Major General Edward B. Giller '40 and you'll find an enormous amount of information about his amazing life and career. I first read his bio and thought, "why hasn't there been a movie made about his life?". Then I realized that the only guy who could possibly play the lead was John Wayne and he has passed away. I tried to ask some questions that hadn't been asked before that might be of interest to the ATOs.

Do you remember any first impressions about the house or the guys?

The house was very new and nice at the time [Ed. Note: Ed joined in 1938 when the Thomas A. Clark Chapter house at 1101 W. Pennsylvania Ave. was just seven years old]. ATO and Sigma Nu were all alone on the south side of campus...with the cows of course.

What was pledging like?

I had attended Kemper Military School for my last two years of high school and first year of college so anything the ATOs threw at me was nothing to what I had experienced at Kemper. That was tough mostly because I hadn't yet figured out how to deal with it. By the time that I got to ATO, I was older and had learned that anything they did was not personal. It didn't bother me. One thing I do remember is that I wasn't a very good singer. They used to make me "sing the phone book" to a tune of their choosing. That was hard and brought a lot of laughs.

I read in a Daily Illini article that referred to you as Ed Gi "Duck" Giller. Was that your nickname in college?

Yes, however that nickname actually followed me from high school. I had broken my ankle in a high school football game and it didn't get set properly. My foot was slightly askew... like a duck... hence the nickname. It's still like that today. I think **Ken Seely** probably brought that name for me to ATO from White Hall. I didn't like it too much so when I left Illinois, it didn't follow me into the rest of my life.

I understand you witnessed the detonation of several Atomic Bombs during the war. What was that like?

I actually witnessed 10 detonations. My team's job was to study the after effects of the bombs. We would assess the viability of requests for different types of experiments and

if they were approved, we would study what would happen. We weren't in charge of implementing the tests... just making measurements of the results. After a detonation, there would be a period where we needed to wear dark glasses, but then we'd get the all clear signal and we could take them off. The light

and boiling colors that were still visible were incredible. Then the shock wave would pass us like a giant... whoosh. It was something.

What message would like to send to the undergrad ATOs about how to be a strong leader?

Don't take yourself too seriously. Don't speak down to anyone. Try to provide examples of what you are trying to get across to your team. There is a need for honesty. Never reprimand a junior in the presence of others. Save it for later. Lead by example. Admit mistakes and draw lessons from them. That's nine and a half decades of pretty good experience and wisdom sorted down to seven points.

The Worst First Half and Best Second Half

It was 1972 and the #1-ranked ATO football squad faced a first half shocker, with Sigma Chi leading 18-0.
