ATO Offers Mentoring Program To Undergraduates

You probably remember your days as a young undergraduate at the University of Illinois. You probably also remember the job search that ensued, shortly after graduation. These days, getting a good job can be quite taxing. But at Gamma Zeta, the young Brothers have an upper hand. They're taking part in a mentor program which is getting great results and our Brothers are securing great jobs.

"It has been great to meet the undergrads through this program and through the

interview practice sessions that we've done," said William Brennan '78. "I've been fortunate to meet some outstanding individuals who are driven, focused, and think big. When I look around at the success of our Alumni, I know they possessed the same qualities. Chicago has an outstanding ATO Alumni network and working with the mentoring program has been a great way for me to stay connected and to meet some great guys currently in the house."

It wasn't always the program that is now being heralded as more than just an opportunity to get assistance finding an internship and a job out of college. For junior **Christian Klos**, it led him to a career-shadowing opportunity at Rolling Stone magazine to now being on the verge of a project management internship with DigitasLBi in downtown Chicago.

A junior in the college of media and advertising, with a double minor in Spanish and Public Relations, Klos is no stranger to maintaining motivation and hard work.

"I'm a third generation American from Poland," said Klos. "I grew up in a very Polish household. I came to campus and wasn't really sure I wanted to join Greek life but I fell in love with Gamma Zeta, the house- it was a winning attitude. I quickly found myself Head Recruitment Chair. When I was a sophomore, we realized this mentor program was there, but not all the way. We decided to sit down last year as a team team- myself, Joe Benkowski, and John Baccaro. We wanted to get people motivate and build the program back from the beginning.

The group of Gamma Zeta Brothers

immediately saw success and the positive impact the program had and decided to run with it. They realized quickly how many Alumni wasnted to be involved as well.

Last year, Klos was blessed with a career shadowing opportunity that his mentor, **Brian Szejka '06,** helped him secure- Rolling Stone Magazine.

This year, he's paired up with **Jack Klues** '77 and is very close to securing an internship with DigitasLBi.



"Jack has been there every step of the way," said the junior. He told me to do my research and tell him where I want to work. I secured a final interview with Digitas and am currently waiting- but I feel great about it.

It's helped me grow into a future media pro, this is more than just an internship. It's experience, guidance, and it helps you in your field.

Asked if being a mentor to an Undergraduate Brother and paying his experience forward is something he'd like to do after graduation, the junior answers with an unequivocal yes.

"Absolutely, said Klos. "It's so nice because it's a hard jump from being a full-time college student to a full-time professional. A lot of guys are scared, and this helps with that. The house has given me a lot, I love this House, I love this Chapter and I would 100% come back and do this after graduation.

For **Sam Selby**, the impact of his mentor, none other than the afore-mentioned Jack Klues, was a tremendous assistance in his quest for full-time employment.

"I became involved with the program as

a freshman," he said. "We were matched up with former ATOs who work in a field similar to our respective majors. I was a student looking to utilize my mentor in the hopes to gain knowledge in my field as well as acquire internships/jobs.

My first mentor was not necessarily involved in the same field as me, causing us to lose contact, Selby revealed. However, he began speaking with Klues on a consistent basis, which to him was extremely helpful.

Klues put Sam in contact with prominent companies in the Chicagoland area.

He credits landing his postgraduation job to Klues.

"My biggest success story was landing a job post-graduation before many of my pledge Brothers," said Selby. "I utilized Jack's and other people's contacts, which was a great way to get my foot in the door. I followed up and was able to schedule interviews in several different companies. I was lucky enough to find out recently that I received a full-time offer from DigitasLBi."

"I hope this program creates a pipeline for undergraduates to have the chance to acquire internships/jobs at a much faster pace," said Selby. "If undergraduates can get hired by Alumni on a consistent basis as well, that would be great. I would definitely pay this experience forward by mentoring a young undergraduate Brother once I have a few years under my belt in my industry."

"With regularity, we had active members reaching out to our Alumni Board (namely Jack and Dane) asking about available job opportunities," said Dan Passarella, an alumnus who coordinates the mentor program. "While they did their best to help out, having only one or two people trying to find jobs for 100+ undergrads was just not sustainable. Given all of the interest in learning about job opportunities within the ATO network we felt it would be a great idea to build a structured system that brought more of our alumni to the table to help out. We also wanted to stress that looking for a job doesn't start your junior/senior year, which is why we assign mentors to freshmen to start guiding them in the right direction, and

also serve as a resource for any questions the undergrad may have as they navigate through college.

I serve as the program lead on the alumni side where I work with my undergrad counterpart to gather information on our new members related to their studies and career interests. We also work to maintain an "inventory" of alumni mentors who have volunteered to take part in the program – this includes recruiting new mentors on a yearly basis. When the time comes each year we work to pair up undergrads with alumni who align with their focus of study or career desires in an attempt to create the most beneficial relationship possible.

The program has definitely been gaining steam in recent years as each year there seems to be more buy in on the undergrad side—I believe this has been driven by the results we've seen. We have had several mentors assist their mentee in finding an internship or full time job position, which is fantastic. While that is certainly the ideal case we've also had a growing number of mentees establish relationships with mentors and leverage them for daily advice related to other aspects of school such as good student groups to get involved with, how to navigate life at ATO and campus in general, and tips on how to expand your network to name a few.

We have had a handful of guys get internships or jobs from the program which is fantastic, but I think my favorite story so far happened recently. We had an alumni go down to the house and spend some time with the undergrads – one of the topics that came up was the mentor program. When he returned back to the city he reached out to me directly and expressed how highly the

undergrads spoke of the program and the value they felt they were getting – this lead to him asking to be involved in the program as well. It's great to hear that our undergrads appreciate the value the program offers, and equally so to see how willing our alumni base is to contribute to its success.

Every year we have mentor pairings that work out, and then we have those that do not for one reason or another. I want to see the program get to a state where each and every undergrad is paired with a mentor and finds value in that relationship. If we can get to that point then I believe there are opportunities to host events or competitions that involve mentor pairings and give them a chance to get to know one another better, but also get to know other mentors as well. It's an outlet that I believe can turn into a very effective way of helping our undergrads build their professional networks before they ever step foot off campus which is extremely valuable as they seek to start their careers."

A sophomore at Illinois and ATO, **Neal Currie '19** has also had success with the program for about a year now.

"I'm majoring in Consumer Economics and Finance with career ambitions toward Marketing and Sales," said Currie. "My grandfather, **Howard Landon '57**, was a Gamma Zeta so Alpha Tau Omega is in my blood! The Gamma Zeta mentorship program was started about 2-3 years ago and we have been working to expand it since! I became the undergraduate director of the program starting this calendar year.

As the Career Development and Alumni Relations Chair for the house, I am the initial link between active members and alumni mentors in the program, and I keep the program running smooth for all

undergraduate brothers.

Results from the program have ranged depending on mentor as well as mentee. However, many undergraduate brothers in the program have gained valuable career insight into the different options that they have ahead of them after graduation, as well as resume critique, interview tips, and even internship opportunities.


I think any success story is a big one and any insight from experience that a mentor can share is invaluable to younger brothers. Chris Klos has seen the most success from the program so far with networking and job opportunities from his mentor, but as we progress this program, this will ideally become the average for mentees.

My hope is for the program to keep growing as older members, who went through the mentorship program and are now working good jobs, began to give back to the active members in the same way that they were helped by their mentor, or even in ways that they had wish their mentor helped them. Also, I'd love to see the program go even further to start organizing networking events between mentors and active members.

Being so involved in the program right now, I absolutely look forward to becoming a mentor for an undergrad brother when the time comes, and I'm sure a lot of other active members feel the same way."
